## Global Public Health Students course evaluation: Summary September – October 2018

A total of 29 evaluations were completed, representing 87.9% of the 33 students registered on this course. This summary does not include the 2 students from the Economics program.

Overall the students were very satisfied with the course (see below the figures). It provided a good overview of the field, interesting discussions and relevant knowledge about different topics in an open, respectful and friendly environment.

The course was considered to be well structured, with well-prepared teachers with international experience. There was a good balance of lectures, with interesting and informative topics, interactive learning in a multicultural environment.

The groups discussions (Lancet paper) and the course project were highly valued. The books were considered appropriate though the Health policy book was considered harder to read.

Some recommendations to improve the course mentioned:

World Game could include more detailed instructions; it could also be reduced to 3 groups; make it more fun, less time

Some slides very compacted

Slides need to be more elaborated, descriptive

Keep the lectures 40-45 min

Too many things going at the same time, stressful some times

More about gender, policy

Possible to add field experiences to public health practice

More videos

More on SDGs

More feedback from teachers regarding the homework

More discussions related to the lectures

More lively lectures with fun and group work

Another way of examining students?

Short exam during the course?

Possible to make more practical some of the lectures?


A knowledge test at the end of each lecture?






