#### General information about academia:

All courses extend over the whole semester, your grade is based on midterms, final exam and often smaller assignments. I liked this because then your final grade is not only based on the final exam.

### **Courses attended**

#### Course 1:

Transportation Management, SCMT 305 - Students learn transportation modes (road, rail, water, air, pipeline and multi-modal transportation), their place in the economy, and the regulatory environment in which they operate.

The course was built upon lectures, quizzes, mid term, final exam as well as a group project with a presentation and a report.

It was not needed to buy any literature, all information needed was given in lectures on power point.

#### Course 2:

Purchasing and Supply Management, SCMT 324 - The course introduces the purchasing and supply management function within the context of an organization's operations, and proceeds to assess its role within the operations of the entire supply chain. The course discusses the strategic importance of purchasing and supply management in developing and fostering contractual relationships with suppliers in global supply network.

The course was built upon lectures, mid term, final exam as well as a two group assignments + report and one individual report.

Workload was not overwhelming and the literature could be borrowed from the library when needed.

## Course 3:

Applied Regression Analysis, STAT 378 - The course introduces methods in regression analysis. Topics include: multiple linear regression with particular focus on diagnostics, non-linear regression, and generalized linear models, such as Poisson regression and logistic regression. Emphasis will be placed on the practical application of the statistical methods.

The course was built upon lectures, mid term, final exam. You also handed in weekly or semi-weekly assignments and finished the curse with a group project with a presentation and a report.

The workload was pretty heavy.
