Course approval

The course syllabus has been confirmed by the Director of Umeå Centre for Gender Studies on June 14, 2019 and is valid from autumn semester of 2019. Revised on February 10, 2022, and January 16, 2024.

Aim and Contents

This course deals with feminist theory focusing on contemporary debates and issues in feminist theory. Focusing on a variety of feminist and intersectional approaches the course will address questions such as: What is feminist theory? How have feminists theorized and understood the relationship between gender, power and subjectivity? The course is divided into broad themes such as politics, re-production, popular culture and sustainability. These themes will be explored through both classical academic theoretical feminist texts, as well as political manifestos and popular texts.

Expected learning outcomes

Upon the completion of the course the PhD student should:

Knowledge and understanding

- Account for and relate to central perspectives, dividing lines, concepts and themes within feminist theory.
- Understand how different feminist theories conceptualise power, gender and subjectivity.

Skills and abilities

- Prepare and deepen relevant discussions and readings of different feminist approaches.
- Apply relevant theories on empirical or theoretical problems.

Judgement and approach

- Be able to reflect on feminist theory as a field of research.
- Be able to analytically reflect on feminist theory in relation to contemporary societal problems.
- Orally and in writing present analyses related to central questions regarding power, gender and subjectivity in feminist theorizing.

Form of instruction and examination modes

The learning outcomes are examined through compulsory seminars, active participation and seminar preparation through individually written papers (so-called reading protocols) presented in relation to each of the themes. The reading protocols are handed in, as well as presented orally. The course is given through lectures and seminars. The course is given in English. The assignments can be written in either English or Swedish, Danish and Norwegian.
